# SPOTLIGHT ON HALLOWEEN

Halloween is celebrated each year on October 31. This year it will fall on a Friday, so celebrations will include typical Trick or Treating and parties will be held everywhere. Meadview is no exception with several traditional Halloween events that take place every year.

Trunk or Treat will return to Halloween evening in the MCA parking lot at 4:30 pm. This popular activity was started many years ago when it was apparent traditional Trick or Treating was not feasible in Meadview with the distances between homes. So they began the practice of Trunk or Treat held in the MCA parking lot. Vehicles will line up with trunks open so candy can be handed out to costumed children of all ages. Some folks decorate their vehicles, add animated characters and wear costumes.

At Anthony's Fisherman's Landing, the annual Baked Goods Auction will start at 6:00 pm. Proceeds from the auction are distributed between the Santa Run, the Easter Party and the Christmas Giving Tree. The baked goods are donated by Meadview residents. If you want to donate anything, call the Landing to be on the list. The annual Halloween Costume Party will start at 8:00 pm with live musical entertainment provided by the Bud Mickle Band. There will be a Costume Contest with prizes awarded to the best, funniest, scariest and best couple costume. The VFW will also host a Halloween Party. Call the Post for details.

Halloween wasn't always about costumes, trick or treat or parties as we know it today. Halloween's origin goes back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-in). The Celts celebrated their New Year on November 1 whch marked the end of summer and the harvest and the beginning of dark, cold winter and was often associated with human death. The Celts believed on the night before the new year, the boundary between the worlds or the living and dead became blurred and the ghosts of the dead returned to the earth.

In the Catholic Church, November 1 was established as All Saints Day to honor all saints and martyrs. The night before was known as All Hallows Eve, thus the name Halloween. Later, the church made November 2 All Soul's Day to honor the dead. All Souls Day was celebrated similarly to Samhain with bonfires, parades and dressing in costumes as saints, angels and devils. The combination of the ancient Celtic rituals and church holidays resulted in Halloween as we know it today.

And now a little Halloween trivia: Did you know that 1/4 of candy sold annually in the US is purchased for Halloween? More people are buying costumes for pets and Americans spent \$700 million on costumes for pets in 2023.





GEOLOGIST AT LARGE- How much gold is in that rock? By Luis Vega

A question I'm often asked is; how much gold is in that rock or in that vein or in that mountain? It is actually a good question with a very complicated answer. There are many questions that are valid that have no perfectly correct answer.

How many deer are in the Hualapai's? If you started counting them one by one, they'd move around and you'd never know if you counted correctly or if you counted one twice. There is a best guess and a perfectly correct answer. The perfectly correct answer would entail lots of work to capture all the deer to avoid counting one twice. Holding them until you caught every

one and then you would know exactly how many there were. Of course, this isn't worth the cost or effort and a best guess method will suffice.

How much gold in a deposit is very important information to base big decisions on. For example, whether to invest millions of dollars to develop a deposit or to walk away.

How do we know how much gold is in the mountain? We can't dig up the entire mountain and measure the amount of gold so we have to rely on a "best guess" method. The first part is to take samples, lots of samples. The second part is to assay the samples. These two parts are where many projects fail. Samples might've been taken incorrectly and weren't representative of the material to be mined and processed or the wrong assay method was used.

Sampling is a science. I have accompanied promoters in the field who wanted to sell a property to the company I worked for. I would always ask them to show me where they took their samples. Many times, their samples were taken along a vein and they said it represented the entire mountain. Then they'd show me complicated drawings with calculations of the size of the mountain. The number of tons would be carefully calculated using complicated formulas. They would then ask me if I was ready to make an offer on their "mine?" I would thank them for their information and tell them I wasn't interested. This didn't make me a popular guy in the promoting fraternity.

In the case of a large copper prospect, one would be making a billion-dollar decision on a deposit that contains 300 million tons of copper ore on samples that might total 100 tons - less than .00000003% of the total deposit. That is a heavy decision to make.

Samples must represent what you want to measure. It could be a hard rock vein deposit or a placer deposit and the goal is to get a "best guess" amount of how much gold there is so that the mining company can make an informed decision that could make or break them.

Samples are taken in several forms. A "grab sample" represents the value in one spot of a particular type of rock. A "channel sample" is one taken over a certain length of rock or vein, and a "bulk sample" is taken by mechanical means, for example, a backhoe or a frontend loader where a large block of material is represented.

If you've explored an old mine in the mountains around Kingman, you've probably seen orange flagging tied to a nail hammered into the rock, an aluminum tag with writing or a line of spray paint on the rock. These mark where someone has taken a sample. The spray paint might be marking where a channel sample started or stopped. A tag might be a grab sample and a large pile of material might be a bulk sample that wasn't processed.

The old timers had crude sampling methods based on what they had on hand. If it was a placer deposit in the desert with no water, they might have taken a sample and dry washed it by using air (small puffs as they held the material near their mouths) or hauled it to the nearest stream, washed it and "counted colors"- counting the number of flecks of gold in the pan. By counting the number of flecks, an experienced placer miner could calculate if it was worth their time to work the gravel.

Hard rock deposits were harder to sample. The old timers would sample a vein, pound the material until it was a powder, pour a little bit of water into a "horn spoon" and wash the powder. They would then count colors to estimate the grade. If there was a nearby town with an assayer, they might haul the material and have it assayed to get a better read. One of the hardest tasks in mining geology is to get the best guess estimate of what is in the ground.
