“JURY DUTY” SCAMS IN MOHAVE COUNTY

The “Jury Duty” scam has been around in Mohave County for a while, but there have been a few recent reports of this occurring in Meadview. Below is a statement that is on the Mohave County Sheriff's Office website documenting how this scam is used on potential victims. The activity described is consistent with the way Meadview residents were scammed



“The Mohave County Sheriff's Office and the County Jury Commissioner's office have advised that some scams are persistent and a particularly deceptive one is making a comeback that is based on “exploiting people's fears.” A local resident recently reported being contacted by a scammer who claimed to be from a local law enforcement agency. The caller falsely stated that the resident had missed jury duty, a warrant was issued for their arrest and paying a fine could prevent an arrest.

This is just one variation of long-running jury duty scams. Scammers may not always demand payment directly. In some cases, they try to trick the potential victim into providing personal information that could be used for identity theft. In other instances, that person might receive an email that appears to include a “jury summons”, but contains malware instead of an official document and downloading the attachment would infect the individual's computer.

What can be done for protection? The Better Business Bureau (BBB) offers these tips:

Be cautious of unsolicited calls or emails. Always question any unexpected communication. Verify with the Court. If there is uncertainty about jury duty status, contact the Jury Commissioner's office at (928) 753-0713 for local service in either Superior or Limited Jurisdiction Courts.

Ignore high-pressure demands for immediate action. Scammers often create a false sense of urgency to trick individuals into acting impulsively.

Avoid paying via wire transfer, prepaid debit cards, digital wallets or cryptocurrency (like Bitcoin, iTunes or similar cards) —these payment methods are almost always associated with fraud.

Ask for a second opinion. If anyone feels uncertain, it's important to talk to a family member or friend and ask, “Does this sound legitimate?”

Vigilance is the key. And knowledge is the best defense.


Women's College Basketball March Madness will start March 18th -19th. UCONN is ranked #1.



GEOLOGIST AT LARGE – Rare Earths

It seems that rare earths are in the news all the time. Tariffs against China are imposed when they restrict rare earth exports and lifted when those restrictions ease. It's hard to understand this situation without understanding the material itself. If rare earths are so valuable, why can't the U.S. produce its own and cut China out of the supply chain?

First of all, rare earths aren't really rare. They are quite common in the Earth's crust, but they don't occur by themselves like gold or copper. Instead, they're components of rock-forming minerals. For decades, they weren't considered important until modern high technology—computer screens, digital cameras, strong magnets, and other devices—created demand. Chemists knew what they were; they're right there on the

Periodic Table hanging on classroom walls. But since there was no practical use for them, prospectors didn't search for rare earth deposits, and metallurgists never developed ways to extract them.

Now that uses have been found for them, rare earths have become both valuable and strategically important. neodymium, for example, is used to make very strong magnets and sells for about \$97,727 per metric ton—roughly \$3 per ounce. Its real value lies in function: without neodymium, electric motors are less efficient, meaning weaker electric cars and less capable technology overall.

The U.S. does have rare earth mines and exploration projects. The largest is the Mountain Pass Mine off I-15, about 60 miles southwest of Las Vegas, just across the California line. From 1951 to 1980, Mountain Pass was the world's leading producer of rare earths. The problem with production isn't mining—it's refining. Extracting usable material from bastnäsite ore, found at Mountain Pass, is a very toxic process. The mine closed in the 1980s over environmental issues. It's a classic case of "we need this, but don't make it in my backyard." China, without those environmental restrictions, stepped in. Today, China controls 85–90% of the world's rare earth refining capacity, making it the global powerhouse in these materials.

Rare earths have been identified in both Mohave and La Paz counties of Arizona. The question is whether those deposits are economic to mine—and, if so, where would the material be refined. In the Aquarius Mountains of Mohave County, rare earths occur in pegmatite dikes—unusual rock types known for hosting exotic minerals. The most famous U.S. pegmatites are in California's Pala District near San Diego, where spectacular tourmaline and beryl (emerald and aquamarine) crystals are found. Unfortunately, the Mohave pegmatites contain only low-quality beryl and spodumene (a lithium mineral), along with minor amounts of rare earths. These pegmatites were prospected in the 1950s for uranium, lithium, and traces of rare earths, but nothing commercial came of it—just a few prospect pits still visible along the dirt road through the Aquarius Range. The large pit on Bull Mountain behind the Game and Fish office off of Stockton Hill Rd., is developed on a large pegmatite that was mined in the 1960s and 1970s for feldspar. I remember seeing the crushing plant next to the railroad tracks on Louise Ave. I wonder if anyone has sampled it for rare earths?

The newest and most promising prospect is the La Paz Rare Earth Project, operated by American Rare Earths Inc. or ARE. The company reports a potential 170 million tons of mineralized rock containing neodymium, praseodymium, and scandium. ARE also holds two rare earth projects in Wyoming and one in Nevada near Searchlight.

It is worth remembering that the challenge with rare earths lies in refining, not in finding them. That's why I find it curious when big headlines appear about securing rare earth rights in places like Ukraine. The bottleneck isn't the ore—it's the metallurgy. What we truly need are more scientists and metallurgists developing cleaner, more efficient refining technologies—or better yet, finding something that can substitute for rare earths altogether.

In my mind, the rare earth problem is a technological one, not a geological one. We know where they are; we just haven't mastered how to handle them cleanly. So, I'll keep looking for gold—and leave the rare earths to the chemists.

Daylight Savings Time starts on March 8. This is the time when most of the country "springs forward".

Arizona stays on Mountain Standard Time, except for the Navajo Nation which does observe Daylight Savings Time. Even though we don't observe DST, we are affected by it because all of our neighboring states do spring forward. Neighboring states of New Mexico and Utah that are in our Mountain Standard Time Zone will be one hour ahead of us. Our Pacific Time Zone neighbors, Nevada and California will be on the same time as we are. Also, the change to Daylight Savings Time affects the timing of most national TV programming.

There is some question if Daylight Savings Time will occur on March 8. The Daylight Savings Act of 2026 could end the confusion, but the bill has to go through a lot of steps in Congress before the clocks stop changing.

Bananas for Bananas

Bananas are an excellent source of fiber, potassium, vitamin B6, vitamin C and various antioxidants. However, in the Arizona heat, they have a very short shelf life. Prevent them from ripening too fast by keeping the bunch intact and wrap the stem end in aluminum foil. Tighten the foil each time you remove a banana from the stem. When bananas become overly ripe, they are still useful for baking. Store them in the freezer with the peel attached until you are ready to bake. They are easily peeled when still frozen.

When you peel the fresh bananas, chop the peels and bury them in your houseplants. They are an excellent source of plant food.
