



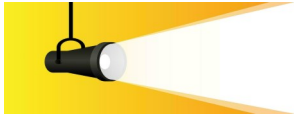

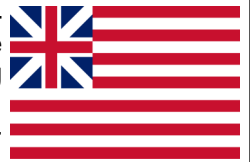

SPOTLIGHT ON THE HISTORY OF THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA By Adrienne O’Keeffe

In the United States, Flag Day is celebrated on June 14. It commemorates the adoption of the Flag of the United States on June 14, 1777 by resolution of the Second Continental Congress. The Flag Resolution states: "Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." The design has remained the same except for the addition of stars for each state admitted to the Union. This has occurred 27 times between 1777 and 1960 when the last star was added representing the statehood of Hawaii. The last 21 stars were added on July 4 following the date when statehood was granted. The most unique feature of the flag is its five-pointed stars. Americans didn't discover them, but we were the first nation to put them on a flag back in 1777.

From 1775 to 1777, the flag that was used by the original thirteen colonies was called the Grand Union Flag. It also contained 13 stripes to represent each of the colonies. However, the canton or blue field contained the Union Jack symbol that acknowledged British colonial rule. It is customary during times of war that flags are carried in the battles. This is the flag that was carried by the colonists in the American Revolution. Upon winning independence from Great Britain, the Union Jack was removed from the flag and replaced by 13 stars.



Legend has it that Betsy Ross sewed the first flag in 1776. While it is true that Betsy Ross did make many flags for the US Navy, there is little evidence that she sewed the first flag. In reality, there were many "first flags". The flag that is known as the Betsy Ross Flag also had 13 stripes and 13 stars that were placed in a circle.



The flag that was adopted on June 14, 1777 was designed by Francis Hutchinson and has been the basis of all the flags from that time on adding a 5-pointed star for each state admitted to the union. However, the first variation of this design was adopted in 1795 adding two stripes and two stars when Kentucky and Vermont were admitted as states. This flag was also called the Star-Spangled Banner. All the flags that followed returned to 13 stripes to show significance of the original 13 colonies.



Every aspect of the flag design is symbolic of the United States of America. There is deeper meaning beyond the use of stars and stripes to symbolize the colonies and states. The stars symbolize the heavens and the divine goal to which man has aspired from time immortal. The stripes are symbolic of the rays of light emanating from the sun. The colors also carrying meaning: **Red** symbolizes hardiness and valor; **white** signifies purity and innocence and **blue** represents vigilance, perseverance and justice.

On June 14, it will a very special Flag Day. This year as we celebrate the 250th anniversary of the birth of our great nation, show honor and respect by flying the flag. If you don't have a flag to fly, get yourself a hand held flag and wave it proudly with the knowledge that is the symbol of everything our country holds true.

U.S. FLAG ETIQUETTE



Proper U.S. flag etiquette, governed by the Federal Flag Code, ensures the Stars and Stripes are displayed with maximum respect. Flag Raising Ceremonies are held at the VFW on most Federal Holidays at 11:00 am.

BASIC HANDLING AND DISPLAY

Never Let It Touch: The flag should never touch the ground, floor, water or anything beneath it.

Time and Weather: Fly the flag from sunrise to sunset. It can be flown 24/7 only if properly illuminated at all times. Do not display it in inclement weather unless it is an all-weather flag.

No Apparel or Decoration: Do not wear the flag as clothing, use it as a blanket/drapery, or print it on disposable items like napkins. For decorations, use red, white and blue patriotic bunting with the blue stripe on top.

Never Mark It: Do not draw on, attach anything to it or use the flag to carry anything.

HANGING AND POSITIONING

Flat on a Wall: Whether hung horizontally or vertically, the blue union (stars) should always be in the top-left corner (the observer's left).

With Other Flags: The U.S. flag must be to its own right (the observer's left), placed higher than all other flags and raised first/lowered last. [

Half-Staff: To fly at half-staff, hoist the flag to the peak briskly, then lower it slowly to the halfway point. When taking it down, hoist it to the peak again before lowering it completely.

RETIREMENT

When a flag is torn, faded or no longer fit for display, it should be destroyed in a dignified and respectful way, preferably through a ceremonial burning. The VFW has a special ceremony for this on Veteran's Day, November 11. They also will provide you with a replacement flag when a flag is presented to them for retirement.

QUAIL STUDDED SEED POT

Hohokam-Sacaton Inspired Pottery

Created by
Mona Lindgren Knoke

This Quail studded seed pot is Hohokam - Sacaton inspired and would normally be a red-on-buff.

It was made from Meadview Clay and fired in a mesquite fire.

ABOUT THIS PIECE

This Quail-studded seed pot is inspired by Hohokam-Sacaton pottery traditions. Traditional examples would commonly feature a red-on-buff finish.

This piece was handcrafted from Meadview clay, gathered and prepared by the artist using traditional methods inspired by Indigenous pottery practices of the Southwest.

The pot was fired in a mesquite fire, creating a direct connection to historic open-fire pottery traditions.

DESIGN ELEMENTS

The stylized quail figures encircling the vessel reflect Southwestern wildlife imagery and traditional decorative forms.

The seed-pot shape references vessels historically associated with the storage or holding of seeds and other important materials.

TRADITIONAL POTTERY PROCESS

Unlike modern wheel-thrown ceramics, this pottery is created entirely by hand. The artist gathers natural clay, hand-forms the vessel without the use of a wheel, decorates the surface, and fires the finished piece using traditional methods.

MATERIALS: Meadview clay

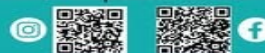

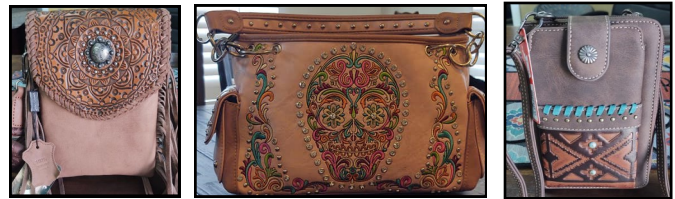
